An intriguing *Matchup* this month. Moline sported the best record in BRASSball as July play commenced. Toledo won their division last year and looks to repeat. Each team will pitch two dominating righties: Schilling for the Cutters and Kerry Wood for the Mudhens. Finally, it will be interesting to see how the ballparks affect this series. As evidenced by the stats above, Toledo plays in a canyon. The Cutters, while they play in no bandbox, have an average park with sluggers to boot. Who will win? Let's see.

The series opened in Moline with the dream mound matchup: Schilling vs. Wood. These two have been breaking bats all season long and are headed towards the All Star game. The contest was scoreless through four as both aces continued to rack up K's. Schilling struck out Jason Tyner to end the Toledo half of the fifth quietly. In the bottom of the frame Ruben Sierra got things going for the Cutters with a solid single. Torii Hunter then whiffed. Scott Brosius was next and rapped a single. Luis Rivas, however, mishandled the throw-in from the outfield, allowing Ruben to scramble in from third. Amazingly, Brosius ended up on third after this wacky play. Einar Diaz followed with a fly to left that got the hustling Brosius in from third. Mark Grace was next with two outs and reached when Mike Lowell kicked the routine grounder away. There were now two outs and a runner on first. Omar Vizquel followed with a single to left that Tyner allowed to get past him to the wall. When the dust settled, the Mudhens had made three errors in the inning and the Cutters had three runs. Another quiet sixth for the Mudhens allowed the Cutters to come up and put this one to bed. Homers from Luis

Gonzalez and Ruben Sierra gave the Cutters a 5-0 lead and they ended up winning 5-1. Schilling went the distance, whiffing nine. Kerry Wood was victimized by his defense, but the two solo-homers would have been the difference anyway.

In game two the Cutters started their new ace acquisition, Chan Ho Park. Vagabond Pat Rapp climbed the hill for the Mudhens. Once again the game started off very quiet as the game was scoreless through four. But once again the Cutters broke out first in the fifth. A leadoff Torii Hunter blast gave Moline a 1-0 lead. The Cutters tried to get some runs across in the fifth as they loaded the bases with two outs. But Rapp struck out Luis Gonzalez to end the threat. That was all Park would need. Chan Ho allowed only one hit and three base runners total through eight innings. Jeff Zimmerman closed the game in the ninth and the Cutters won easily 3-0.

The finale in Moline pitted Jeff Suppan versus Ismael Valdes. The Mudhens finally woke up as they had three runs on the board after their first time at bat. A two run shot from Richie Sexson the key hit. Shane Halter then led off the second with a solo shot and, whaddya know, the Mudhens were out front 4-0. The Cutters hung in this one though. Ellis Burks got two back in the bottom of the second on his homer. Valdes settled down, allowing his teammates to get him on the mound. In the bottom of the fourth the lower third of the Cutter order generated two more runs. The game was now tied up at four. The bottom of the fifth proved to be the undoing of Jeff Suppan. A one out walk seemed harmless as Suppan quickly whiffed Bret Boone for the second out. But into the batter's box stepped veteran Ellis Burks. Ellis responded with his second two-run homer of the game. That was enough for Suppan as Ray called Bob Wells in from the pen. Torii Hunter greeted Wells with the fourth homer of the game. Now up 7-4 the Mudhen bats went quietly the rest of the way. Two more homers finished the score off at 10-4. In Moline the Mudhens were manhandled and out-homered 8-2. They would need the home park to even things out for them.

The opener in Toledo started with the odd pairing on the mound of Dicky Gonzalez and Kelvim Escobar. This game reverted to form, as the score was held to 1-1 through six innings. The Mudhens were finally able to get some offense going as they exploded for seven runs in the seventh and eighth to win 8-1. The key hit that sent them on their way was a two-run homer from Edgar Martinez off of reliever Rolando Arrojo.

Game two in northern Ohio saw Kevin Jarvis facing Dave Burba. Cutters got back on their horse early in this one, breaking out to a three zip lead after the first inning. Luis Gonzalez nailed a two-run homer, while Ruben Sierra smacked a gapper to plate Bret Boone. But the Mudhens battled back in the second. After a leadoff single, Jarvis whiffed Lowell and Burnitz, seemingly on his way to an innocuous second frame. But the 'Hens got a two-out rally started. Ramon Hernandez singled and Jose Macias followed with a double for one run. Jarvis then proceeded to walk the number nine hitter, Damian Rolls, to load the bases and subsequently get guys scurrying around in the pen. Luis Rivas, sensing the moment, rapped a bases clearing double that got the score in the Mudhens favor, 4-3. Jarvis ended up walking for the showers, muttering all the way. In the Cutter fifth things started to get interesting again. Two singles and two outs later left Bret Boone up in a clutch situation. He forced a walk from reliever Troy Brohawn to load the bases. Ruben Sierra delivered again in the series, this time a two-run base hit that put the Cutters back out on top 5-4. But the Mudhens were not interested in losing this one it appeared. With two outs in the bottom of the fifth, Edgar Martinez tied the affair up at five with a double. John Reidling came on in the seventh for the Mudhens and was super-tough. He allowed no Cutter to reach base in the last three innings. In the bottom of the seventh the Mudhens generated the winning run after Damian Rolls singled to lead off. He promptly stole second which allowed Luis Rivas to be the hero of the game as he scored Rolls with a solid base knock. Two games at home and the Mudhens were back in the series.

Game three in Toledo finally saw the rematch of Game One. Schilling faced Wood once again. The Cutters got on the board first with an RBI single from Luis Gonzalez in the first. In the bottom of the third the Mudhens drew even. Shane Halter tripled to start the inning and came home on a groundout. The pitchers kicked in and all stayed quiet through seven. Ray relieved Wood after he gave up a leadoff to double Einar Diaz to start the eighth. Ray then massaged his pen to get two quick outs from his relievers. Roberto Hernandez was brought on to face the man we haven't heard a peep from yet: Barry Bonds. Proving it was only a matter of time, Bonds slugged a long double that just missed going out. That left the score 2-1 for the Cutters. Schilling closed the game himself as he got the Mudhens to go 1-2-3 in the ninth. Schilling 2, Wood 0.

The finale brought Park and Suppan back out to the mound. Through four complete neither team could muster a run. But thanks to a Tyner triple and a Burnitz homer the Mudhens saw themselves up 2-0 after six. Ruben Sierra, again, cut the lead in half in the top of the seventh with a solo shot. But the Mudhens would not be denied. A big two-run double from Richie Sexson got the lead out to 4-1 for the Toledo. In the eighth, Shane Halter sealed the victory when he knocked in two with a sharp single.

The series ended up in Moline's favor 4-3. Some very exciting contests this month. I dare say this *Matchup* has proven to be the best so far. Cutters out-homered Toledo 8-2 in Moline and swept the three games there. Back in Toledo the teams shared four total dingers which is much more amenable for Ray's squad. One last note: Barry Bonds went 4-21 with his only ribbie winning game six. I think the Cutters are very deep when they are able to overcome this.

Late additions were made to both lineups as the starting DH's were named: Ichiro for the NL and Mags Ordonez for the AL. The ump signaled to start the affair and it was begun.

Both starters were strong to start. Johnson and Schilling both threw two impressive innings without allowing a run. The Unit was able to rack up four whiffs in his brief start. The AL turned to Brooklyn's Greg Maddux who was able to keep the NL scoreless for another inning. For the NL Chan Ho accomplished the same.

In the bottom of the fourth with one out, Mark Buehrle was brought on to face sweet swinging Barry Bonds. The AL home run leader lived up to his credentials and deposited a souvenir of his own in the bleachers to get a run back for the Americans. Buehrle settled in and was able to get Manny Ramirez and Jason Giambi with little trouble.

Pitching quieted the game down in the fifth. Ocelot Javier Vazquez impressively sat Jose Cruz, Mike Piazza and Eric Chavez down 1-2-3.

In the top of the sixth Todd Helton led off with a walk. Sosa followed, this time flying out. Rookie Berkman then notched a second hit, this time a double to put runners on second and third with one out. Mariano Rivera then came in from the pen and was greeted with much applause from the hometown faithful. Giles lofted a long fly to Manny in right who retreated all the way to the track. Both runners moved up easily on that one and the Nationals now had a 5-1 lead. In came pinch hitter Albert Pujols, and like fellow newcomer Berkman, drilled a gap double off Mariano to make the score 6-1. The sixth finally ended with Paul Lo Duca whiffing, but now the Nationals were securely in front of their rivals.

The pitching returned to form in the seventh and eighth innings. The Americans just couldn't get their bats started. In the seventh they went 1-2-3 in the face of Joe Mays while in the eighth Troy Percival induced Alex Rodriguez into a double play. Jeff Zimmerman and Tom Gordon got the Americans through the top of the ninth to give them one last shot at a rally.

In the bottom of the ninth Robbie Alomar harmlessly grounded to short. On came Billy Wagner for the NL, who promptly walked Vlad Guerrero. Barry Bonds then followed with a triple to score the only other run for the Americans. Manny whiffed to follow and Jeff Bagwell ended it with a groundout. The Nationals had a 6-2 win.

With four ribbies, three coming on a long homer, Brian Giles was an easy choice as this year's game MVP.

A hearty thanks to Kevin for managing this season's All Star game. He assured me that he quite enjoyed his duties. Next year's All Star destination? Who knows? I can tell you a NL manager will host it ☺

AL Notes

The AL East had a fine month as a group in the month of July. While the Cutters didn't have the best month in the division (17-11), they still maintain a comfortable lead. Barry Bonds rebounded from an off month: .330-10-23. He now holds the AL home run lead with 41. Torrid, oops Torii, Hunter played like he was upset over not making the All Star squad. In July he hit .309 and led the Cutters with 12 bombs. Luis Gonzalez drove in 26 runs despite a .269 average. Omar Vizquel's .182 July has sunk his average on the season to .248. On the mound, Schilling wasn't perfect. He just went 7-1 instead. New acquisition, Chan Ho Park, was 5-2 with a 2.57 ERA. Zimm got into only four games, but saved them all while not allowing a runner.

Hessville was able to pick up a game on Moline with their 18-10 July. The 'Readys hit .306 in July, highlighted by Jose Vidro's .438 month and Larry Walker's .398. Walker also led with 7 dingers and scored 24 runs. All Stars Jason Giambi and CJ both hit over .330 after their selections. BJ Surhoff stumbled in July, managing to hit only .217. No matter, he's still at .297 for the year. Tom Gordon finally allowed an earned run in July! His 38 saves are supported by a 0.27 ERA for the season. Oh my! While Shawn Estes (5-0, 2.93) and Shane Reynolds (4-1) had very fine months, this is a staff that still depends greatly on its pen for success. No Everready starter has an ERA below four on the year.

Georgia held strong in July, going 17-11. Andruw Jones quickly becoming a fan fave in the Peach State as hit .304 for the month with a team leading 9 souvenirs and 29 ribbies. Continuing in his platoon role, Paul O'Neill hit .341 in July. Bubba Trammell and Dmitri Young provided the Braves with strong play in part time roles. Keith Foulke recorded a save in each of his nine appearances. In the process he got his earner on the year down to a respectable 3.19. Tim Wakefield posted a fine 2.63 ERA in 24 innings of swing duty. Wade Miller (4-0) and Tim Hudson (5-1) sparkled in July. Freddy Garcia continued to have a rough year in July, going 1-5. He is now a surprising 7-12 on the season.

Thanks to an AL best 19-9 July the Mudcats find themselves back in the wild card race. Inspired, the team's wacky management went out and acquired Ray Lankford in time for August play. Sean Casey hit .333 with 14 doubles in July. The Mayor is now tied for the AL's two-bagger lead with Vlad Guerrero. Geoff Jenkins finally broke out of a season long slumber as he hit .317 for the month and led the Mudcats with 25 ribbies. Local favorite, Hank White, hit .078 in July. No matter, as Hank's bobble-head day is still scheduled for August 13th vs. Springfield. Matt Morris continues his run as he went 5-0, 1.54 in July. Kirk Rueter was 4-1, 2.12 for the month. Trevor Hoffman notched eight saves despite a five plus ERA.

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In July the Mauler fans not only witnessed the All Stars, they also got to see their local heroes continue their march towards an unprecedented sixth straight division title. For the month the Maulers went 18-10. Mike Piazza poured it on in July as he drove in 35 runners with the aid of 13 homers. Vlad Guerrero hit .366 for the month and now sits a hair behind Larry Walker in the batting race (.354-.353). Desi Relaford (.327) and Abe Nunez (.327) had nice months in part time duty. After missing out on an All Star

appearance Gary Sheffield hit .344. Toy Glaus' .214 in July has him down to .238 now for the season. Roger Clemens a steady 3-1, 3.35 July. Rocket is 13-8 on the year and is leading the Mauler staff. Terry Adams returned to a swing role and posted a 5.65 ERA. He is still 11-2 on the season though. Mariano Rivera 10 July saves.

July was the best month of the year (18-10) for the Rubes so far. Mags Ordonez continues to have a fine year and July just added on for him: .350-10-28. Carlos Lee broke out of season-long doldrums to hit .322 with 13 doubles. Eric Young leading the swiftest AL team with 32 steals. All Star rookie Jose Cruz Jr. hit .240 in July, walking only 3 times and whiffing 26 times. Ouch! Tanyon Sturtze's fine 2.78 earnie in July could only net him a 2-1 record. Scott Sullivan went 3-0 in 19 plus innings of July work. Hideo Nomo continued to reverse a bad start to the season as he posted a 3.76 ERA in July. Jason Schmidt (6.43) a rough month.

For the sake of the fans up in Plaza, I hope things don't get worse than they did in July for the Lions (4-24). The Lions were just raw meat for the grinder that is the AL East in July. Not surprisingly the team ERA was a mountainous 6.81. Rod Beck did notch two saves in relief with a 2.70 ERA. Call-up Ben Sheets lost all six of his starts. Gil Heredia (9.86) was punished in 21 innings of relief work. Hitting star in July was Tony Eusebio who led the Lions in hitting (.333), homers (5) and tied for ribbies (16). Tony Womack continued his steady season as he hit .288 with five steals for the month.

Box City had a 6-22 July, but that wasn't enough to get in front of Plaza. Troy O'Leary delivered in July: .330-9-25. He led the team in all categories. Recently traded (twice!) Ray Lankford hit .328 in July, which made him attractive to Toledo then Minny. Miguel Tejada hit .317 to get himself up to .269 on the year. Miguel leads the Boxmen with 21 dingers on the year. Darin Erstad at .252 is not playing up to his contract at the moment. Esteban Loaiza's 2-3 July led the staff. Dave Mlicki (14.77) was destroyed in his five starts. Somehow he only lost two games, though.



Well Toledo still holds a comfortable lead in the AL West, but the Mudhen faithful are hoping the 10-18 July doesn't portend an ominous future. Amazingly, the team leader in hitting in July for the Mudhens was Edgar Martinez at only .253. Jeromy Burnitz smacked seven dingers in July. It was another rough month for Richie Sexson (.213). Brian Hunter stole six bases while amassing only 20 AB's. Jeff Suppan 3-2, 3.63 in July to lead the starters. Mike Matthews went 0-2 despite a team best 3.10 earnie. Roberto Hernandez is possibly auditioning now for an AL club after he posted a 1.04 July ERA. Kerry Wood had a horrible July: 1-4, 6.33.
