Ah, finally a meeting of the Brothers Kjarsgaard for the *Matchup* series. Both of these clubs are quite close record-wise. Statistically, though it would appear the Walkers excel a bit more than the Topes at both hitting and pitching. Of note is the two clubs home run differential for their parks. Springfield actually hits more big flies on the road while the Walkers enjoy the cozy confines of Riverfront Stadium.

Game 1: Chuck Finley (FLE) versus Mark Redman (SPR)

Two talented lefties were scheduled to start the series. The Walkers struck immediately in the first frame when Paul Konerko's two-out single allowed Bobby Abreu to trot in from third with the first run. But in the bottom of the first the Topes made some noise of their own when Jeff Bagwell's plunking loaded the sacks with only one out. Larry Walker followed Bagwell and he was able to bloop a single to shallow left to score one run. Unfortunately the Topes couldn't get any further runs across as Robbie Alomar's 6-4-3 double play killed the inning. To start the second the Walkers went right back to work as the first two batters reached. After number nine hitter Craig Counsell lined out to second, up came Lou Merloni. Lou was able to connect to Redman's offering and sent the ball flying to deep right center. From there it caromed off the wall and past the frantically charging Marquis Grissom. The ball bounded away from Grissom and Lou had an easy two-run triple. Abreu promptly followed with a base knock to make it 4-1.

The Walkers would finish the second up 5-1. After batting in the fourth the Walkers would have this one put to bed as they went 7-1 at that point. Finley pitched into the seventh to pick up the in for the Walkers. The final score would end up 7-4 with Konerko contributing 3 rbi on the day.

Game 2: Scott Eyre (FLE) versus Mark Mulder (SPR)

The second game saw yet another all-lefty matchup. To start the second Jim Edmonds led off with a double for the Walkers. After a Tom Wilson whiff, Raul Ibanez came up and delivered a solid single to put runners on the corner. Shane Halter followed and he was able to drive in the first run of the contest with a sac fly. With Merloni's subsequent single the sacks were full for Abreu. Abreu was able to respond in the situation as his solid single up the box brought in two runs for an early 3-0 lead for the Walkers. Surprisingly, the second inning Walker outburst would be all that Eyre would need on the hill. Eyre pitched into the eighth and allowed only three hits on the day. The final ended up 4-1 to the Walkers favor. Mike DeJean closed out the game to secure the Walkers second victory.

Game 3: Derek Lowe (FLE) versus Jarrod Washburn (SPR)

A very fine pitching matchup for game three. To start the game the Walkers put their first two batters on base. Chipper Jones was up third and his ground out to second moved the runners up for Jorge Posada. Washburn was now in trouble because he had to choose between two difficult options: Posada at the dish or Edmonds in the on deck circle. Washburn conferred on the mound with Mike Redmond and they set their sights on retiring Posada. The plan did not succeed as Jorge was able to drill a double to the gap that easily plated two runs for the Walkers. Up 2-0 Lowe was able to go to work with a nice lead. Lowe, however, stumbled badly as a double and a single to the first two hitters left runners on the corners with none out. Luis Gonzalez was next and his ground out was able to get back one run while keeping the heat on Lowe. With runners on first and second Lowe now had to get past the dangerous Jeff Bagwell. Lowe was able to get Bags to also ground into a fielders choice. With two out now Lowe was almost out of the dark. He wasn't. The mighty Matt Stairs stepped in to take his cuts. Stairs was able to lay off the first two Lowe offerings to go up 2-0 in the count. Lowe came back with a fastball on 2-0 but Stairs was locked in as he yanked it down the right field line for a two-run blast that made the score 3-2 Topes. Somewhat surprisingly that would be all the scoring in this game. The Walkers challenged from time to time in the game but Washburn was always able to turn them back.

Game 4: Al Leiter (FLE) versus Ramon Ortiz (SPR)

The pitching was masterful in game four. Through seven innings this contest was scoreless. After their seventh innings Ortiz had yielded only three hits and Leiter only two! But in the bottom of the eighth the Topes struck to secure a victory. After his second whiff of the inning Leiter was seemingly through the eighth as he just needed to get around Marquis Grissom with one runner on base. Grissom took an awful swing at Leiter's offering and sent a bouncer down to Konerko at first. The ball must of hit a rock or something because it bounced over Konerko's glove for an error. Rattled, Leiter now had to get around Luis Gonzalez, but he couldn't as Luis coaxed a walk from Leiter to load the bases. Leiter was now clearly exhausted and was lifted in favor of Mike DeJean. DeJean's pressing assignment was to retire Bagwell. But Bagwell got the better of DeJean and delivered a double that plated the two winning runs for the Topes.

Game 5: Kyle Lohse (SPR) versus A.J. Burnett (FLE)

In the bottom of the second the Walkers exploded for five runs. Booby Abreu smacked a two-run double and Konerko followed shortly thereafter with a huge three-run blast off of Lohse. Down 5-0 the Topes were going to have to scrap. In the top of the third they got two back with the aid of Larry Walker's two-out, two-run double. In the bottom of the fourth the Walkers could have put the game to rest when they loaded the sacks with none out. Konerko strode to the plate with a chance to deliver an even bigger hit. But Konerko couldn't do it as he grounded weakly into a double play. Still, the Walkers were able to leave the frame comfortably ahead 6-2. In the top of the sixth that man, Matt Stairs, did it again as he connected this time for a two-run homer to narrow Fleetwood's lead to 6-4. In the top of the eighth Jorge Julio was trying to get the game to closer Mike DeJean. The rook couldn't do it though as a single and two walks left the sacks loaded and DeJean was summoned sooner to the game. His first batter to face was Stairs. Stairs was up to the task yet again, this time doubling down the right field line. Two runs came in and the game was all square at six. Veteran Orlando Merced was next and he knew what to do as he drilled a single back up the box that scored two more runs to make it 8-6 Springfield. After starting down five runs the Topes had completed an improbable rally to pull out the victory here in game five.

Game 6: Mark Redman (SPR) versus Chuck Finley (FLE)

In the top of the third of this one the Walkers seemingly imploded as a squad as they committed two errors with the bases loaded. After all the frantic play of the inning finished Fleetwood would find themselves down 4-0. But the Walkers were determined and in the bottom of the frame returned the favor as they sent eleven batters to the dish. Redman somehow finished the inning for the Topes, but not without yielding six runs. Two doubles and a triple were interspersed with two wild pitches and a Tope error. All in all they were able to score six runs to reverse their fortunes in this one quite quickly. That would be all Finley and the Walkers would need as they ended up cruising to an 8-5 victory. Finley was able to whiff 10 batters on the day and allowed only one earned run.

Game 7: Mark Mulder (SPR) versus Scott Eyre (FLE)

The series was all square at three games apiece and the pitching matchup was a replay of the solid game two matchup. The clubs traded solo runs in the second inning to make it 1-1. In the top of the fourth the Topes the notched all the runs they would need to secure the series. Three runs would come across with Mike Redmond's clutch two-run single proving to be the big blow. Mulder kept the Walkers at bay for seven innings when he then yielded to a pen that did the same.

This series easily could have gone to the Walker's favor. Both teams played quite well as one could sense a playoff atmosphere around all seven games. Indeed these clubs may well see each other later in the year when the games are just a bit more important.

Another fine 20-8 month from the Rattlers has them safely atop the East. David Bell swung a big bat for the Rattlers in August as he slugged 7 dingers and drove in 23. Jeromy Burnitz also

was a solid contributor as he knocked 8 out of the park and collected 22 rbi. Gene Kingsale hit .300 with 5 swipes. Derrek Lee had a down August as he hit only .231 and committed 5 errors. Andruw Jones also slumped in August as he hit just .216. A.J. Pierzynski leads the club with a .323 average for the year. Tim Hudson went 4-1 in August with a 2.70 ERA. Russ Ortiz and Freddy Garcia also won four games. Keith Foulke allowed only one run enroute to five August saves. Wade Miller posted a fine 2.13 ERA for the month but only went 1-2. Reliever Darren Holmes has allowed only 26 baserunners in 42 innings this season.

The Mudcats solidified their playoff chances with a 19-9 August. Newcomer Pudge had an impressive debut as he hit .355 for the month with 8 jimmy-jacks and 17 rbi. The Mudcats clubbed out 55 homers in August and A-Rod was a big contributor to that huge total as he slugged 15. A-Rod also got on at a .409 clip and drove in 39 runs. Scott Hatteberg posted a .442 OBP in August. As well as those two performed a few slumped terribly in August. Mark Ellis (.178), Jeremy Giambi (.171) and Mark Kotsay (.146) were miserable in the month. Out on the hill Kirk Rueter went 4-1 with a 2.65 ERA. Rueter is now 15-6 on the campaign. Pedro Astacio somehow won three games despite allowing 12 taters in 39 innings of work.

The Cutters got themselves back to .500 with a solid 18-10 month of August. Barry Bonds was just ridiculous in August as he hit .378 and walked 42 times! That works out to a gaudy .608 OBP. Torii Hunter hit .317 with 8 homers and 25 rbi. Bret Boone finally got going as he hit .351, slugged .588 and drove in 28 in August. Omar Vizquel batted .301 for the month and scored 23 times. Greg Maddux's 6-1 month of August was quite impressive, but Mark Prior was even better. The youngster went 4-0 with 1.38 earnie. Oh, and he threw two one-hit shutouts in the month also. Oh my! Kelvim Escobar picked up six August saves.

The Everreadys struggled through another month as they went 5-23 in August. Terrence Long was the best hitter by far as he hit .305 with 3 homers and 10 rbi. Alex Gonzalez collected 8 doubles and scored 14 times. Delino DeShields swiped 7 bags in August. Jack Wilson still having a nice rookie season as he sits on a .285 batting average. The Maulers are simply waiting for the playoffs to begin after their 21-7 August. Nomar had the big month for the Maulers as he hit .349 and slugged .713 while driving in 34. Alfonso Soriano flashed that power/speed combo of his by slugging 12 taters and swiping 9 bases in August. Vlad Guerrero's 10 August homers now leaves him 9 short of the regal total of 60. Mike Piazza hit .324 in August with 10 two-baggers. Pickup Steve Finley struggled a tad (.235 BA) in his new digs. Jason Giambi quietly enjoying a season that sees him slugging at a .617 clip and posting a .425 OBP. Tom Glavine back on track with his 5-1, 2.72 performance in August. Steve Trachsel went 4-1 in August with a 2.60 earnie. Pedro now 19-3 on the year. Mariano Rivera picked up 5 more saves in August.

After a 16-12 August the Rubes first playoff appearance has come more into focus. Cliff Floyd swung the hot Rube bat in August as he hit .373 with 15 doubles, 10 homers and 28 rbi. Carlos Lee hit .409 with 6 taters in part time action. Ellis Burks keeps on chugging along as he hit .338 with 6 August homers. Robin Ventura kinda slumped in August. He did hit only .162, but

Santa Barbara has a division title firmly in view after their 17-11 month of August. Jacque Jones hit .295 with 6 homers and 16 rbi. Adam Kennedy hit .337 in August. Catcher Dan Wilson hit .344 with 7 two-baggers. Rich Aurilia (.204 BA in 2003) needs to get going in the final month for the playoffs. Garrett Anderson has 45 doubles so far and Aaron Boone has 36 steals. The Outlaw staff posted a fine 3.35 ERA in August. Bartolo Colon won the

most games (4), but Tomo Ohka (2.45) and Matt Clement (3.16) put together better stat lines. Indeed, Clement tossed the third BRASSball no hitter of 2003! Robb Nen saved 11 August games for the Outlaws. Rodrigo Lopez is an impressive 12-5 with a 2.95 ERA in his rookie year.

La Crosse's 9-19 month of August has left them with slim playoff hopes. Offensively, the team fell apart in August hitting only .234 as a team to go along with 21 homers. The two biggest Lager bats, Manny Ramirez and Mike Sweeney, hit .244 and .230 respectively in August. Mark Grudzielanek hit only .180 but somehow led the club with 11 Lager ribbies. Aubrey Huff (.344) and Gary Matthews Jr. (.320) were two of the few bright spots in August. Kip Wells went 2-2 with a 3.68 earnie in August. Carl Pavano pitched well enough (3.76 ERA), but couldn't win a game in August. Troy Percival saved 5 of the 9 Lager victories.

Toledo is almost back to .500 after a 13-15 August. Randall Simon continued a fine season by hitting .340 with 5 homers and 20 rbi. For the year Randall is now hitting .326. A pleasant surprise he has been for Mudhen faithful. Richie Sexson (.333, 10 doubles) and Orlando Cabrera (.324, 11 doubles) also had big months. Luis Castillo hit .336 and stole 14 more bags to raise his league leading total to 78. Brian Meadows was 4-0 with a 3.48 ERA in his five August starts. Mike Mussina pitched well in August as he posted a 3.26 ERA, but just couldn't get enough runs behind him and thus went 3-3. Pretty much the story of Moose's 2003 campaign.

The Bulldogs went 11-17 in August. Tony Clark hit .338 with 6 doubles in platoon duty. Alex Gonzalez hit .296 with 16 runs scored and 5 taters in August. Brian Daubach cranked out 6 more homers in August. Despite batting only .237 for the month, Tsuyoshi Shinjo led the club with 20 rbi and 17 runs scored. Denny Neagle was 2-2 with a 2.97 ERA in August. Fellow southpaw Omar Daal also won two games while registering a 3.99 ERA. Ryan Dempster was knocked around in August as he allowed 83 baserunners in 47 innings of work.

Springfield stayed in first after a 17-11 month of August. Larry Walker hit .305 in August but that actually lowered his batting average to .353 for the season. Walker led the club with 18 August ribbies. Catcher Mike Redmond hit .339 for the month. Michael Tucker doubled 9 times, swiped 7 bases and led the club with 5 August homers. Jeff Bagwell registered a .388 OBP in August. Robbie Alomar slumped in August, hitting only .218. Mark Mulder led the moundsmen as he went 3-1 with a 2.17 earnie. Billy Wagner picked up two relief wins and

saved 7 more games in August. Ramon Ortiz pitched well (3.86 ERA) but ended up 2-3 in his August starts. Jarrod Washburn is 16-8 with a 3.49 ERA in 2003.

The Mets have pretty much secured a playoff spot with their 17-11 month of August. All that is left to see now is if they can catch the Topes in the final month. Albert Pujols carried the big lumber as he hit .339 with 10 dingers and 24 ribbies. Jose Vizcaino posted an impressive .358 BA in August. Rookie Ramon Vazquez had another nice month (.308 BA). In 43 August at bats Danny Bautista slugged .721 and got on at a .432 clip. El Duque was tough on the hill in August as he went 4-1 with a 2.89 earnie. Barry Zito went 3-2 with a 3.07 ERA. Luis Vizcaino netted 5 August saves while veteran Bob Wickman picked up four for himself.

Port Richey went 10-18 in August. Joe Randa hit .357 with 9 doubles and 15 rbi. Jay Payton was especially impressive for the 'Glades as he hit .309, walloped 9 homers and drove in 29 runs. Doug Mientkiewicz posted a .395 OBP to help him cross home 20 times. Port Richey batters have been plunked 85 times which leads the NL by a healthy (or is that unhealthy) margin. If Damian Moss (7-8, 3.89, 143 innings, 105 hits) could get some runs when he pitches he may just yet get himself into ROY consideration. No PR starter could get below a 4.50 ERA in August with Julian Tavarez (1-4, 9.84 ERA) faring the worst.

Charlevoix struggled through another rough month as they went 8-20 in August. Some players continue to astound in Charlevoix. Foremost is Brad Fullmer who hit .429 in August with 12 doubles. On the season Fullmer now has 40 two-baggers. Little Mark Loretta hit .336 with 16 rbi. Frank Thomas equally impressive in August as he hit .313, posted a .406 OBP, scored 24 times, slugged 7 homers and drove in 28 runs. The Tigers hit .291 as a team in August. Travis Driskill fared the best of the pitchers as he went 3-2 with a 4.29 ERA. John Stephens had his hat handed him (0-6, 13.67 ERA) in August.

A 19-9 month for the Sioux has them firmly in control of the Central and the second seed for the NL playoffs. Bernie Williams put together a big month as he hit .388 with 5 homers and 18 rbi. Jeff Kent hit .345, slugged .618 and drove in 19 runs. Randy Winn collected 9 August doubles. Ryan Klesko hit .306 in August. Jermaine Dye is slumping as he hit .216 in August and has fallen to .234 for the season. Raffy Palmeiro whacked 8 long balls and drove in 23 runs in August. Randy Johnson went 5-1 on the bump with a 2.54 earnie. Curt Schilling went 4-2. Schilling and Unit have combined for 38 victories in 2003. Jose Mesa picked up 6 August saves despite some unsteady moments as his 7.36 ERA reflects.

Fleetwood stumbled slightly in August as they went 14-14. Chipper Jones very solid in August as he hit .382, posted a .673 slugging and got on at a .481 clip. Frank Catalanotto tripled 4 times in 29 at bats. Bobby Abreu was very productive for the Walkers in August as he scored 28 runs and drove in 25 more. Jorge Posada hit .282 with 10 doubles and 22 ribbies. The Walkers as a team smacked 67 two-baggers in August. Paul Konerko led the club with 26 August ribbies. The pitching staff is what let the Walkers down as it came in with a 4.75 August ERA. Chuck Finley won four times despite a plus-five ERA. Al Leiter did post a 3.34 ERA. Brad Penny performed poorly (8.31 ERA).
